Interim Moderator's Letter

When the invitation came to submit articles for the most recent edition of the Tower, I wasn't quite fast enough off the mark. I'm now happy to have the chance to introduce myself as Interim Moderator of St Michael's Parish Church during the vacancy. The opportunity to lead worship over the last twelve years has been a chance for me to get to know different folk at St Michael's. I have other connections too with St Michael's which you can discover in conversation with me. I look forward to a deepening relationship with the Kirk Session and the wider membership of St Michael's in so far as I can manage that, and my prayer is that God has someone in mind, and will lead that person to be the next minister of St Michael's.

My role will be to chair the meetings of the Kirk Session and other congregational meetings which are part of the process, as well as acting as advisor to the Nominating Committee. The Kirk Session is in the process of putting together what's known as a Parish Profile, a document which shows interested applicants what St Michael's is about, and what our vision is for the next five years. Part of this vision is laid out in what's called a Basis of Reviewable Charge, and the congregation will vote on this on Sunday 3rd December 2017, and I'll be involved with that exercise at the end of worship.

Elsewhere in this edition of the Tower, you can read something of what's involved in being a member of the Nominating Committee. There are also links there to a couple of pieces of useful information on the Church of Scotland website, about the vacancy process. The Nominating Committee will sift applications, shortlist, interview, and hear potential candidates leading worship, and will then bring the name of a nominee. The nominee will then lead a service of worship for the congregation, at the end of which the congregation will vote by secret ballot.

All being well, the congregation will meet at the close of worship on Sunday 17th December to elect the Nominating Committee. The congregation will be ably supported in the vacancy process by three members of the Presbytery of Edinburgh, the Presbytery Advisory Committee. The Rev Dr Stewart Weaver is minister at Portobello and Joppa; the Rev Sheena Orr is chaplain at HMP Saughton; and Hugh McDiarmid is an elder in Newhaven Parish Church.

I've been a minister for 30 years, and for the last nineteen years, I've worked in the Church of Scotland offices in George Street, as part of the Ministries Council. I'm married to Fiona, who's been minister at Carrick Knowe Parish Church for over sixteen years – although she's been ordained for longer than me, and is better qualified.

The Rev Stewart Lamont has been locum at St Michael's since mid-September, and the Kirk Session is grateful to him for his leadership of worship, and the exemplary pastoral care he has given within the time constraints of what is possible. We thank Stewart, and Lara, his wife, for their presence, and it's with regret that we take our leave of Stewart as locum at the end of December.

Could you serve on the Nominating Committee?

At the close of worship on Sunday 17th December, as part of the vacancy process in St Michael's, the congregation will meet to elect a Nominating Committee. It will be the task of the Nominating Committee to look for and recommend one person deemed to be suitable to be the minister of the congregation and parish.

Eleven (11) members of the congregation will serve on the Nominating Committee, and they can be elders, members, or adherents, whose names are listed on the Electoral Register. The aim will be to put together a Nominating Committee which is representative of the congregation as far as is possible, so I would ask all who are reading this to give prayerful consideration as to whether you might be willing to serve.

If there are more than eleven names proposed and seconded, then the opportunity will be given for folk to withdraw; if there are still more than eleven names, there will be an election, and the Kirk Session has decided that this will be conducted via a show of hands.

There will be at least one meeting in each month during the vacancy, as wording of an advert is decided; as applications are sifted and shortlisted following the setting of a closing date; and as visits are made to hear prospective applicants conduct worship, so there will be the occasional Sunday when members of the Nominating Committee will not be in St Michael's.

Confidentiality is an important part of the process, and the Nominating Committee will work in private.

The sense of exact control of feel and shape for using the pedal board is a vital technique in playing and I have never used any other footwear. As can be seen they're a bit shabby but still perfectly reliable.



My organ shoes have just been re-soled and heeled for more years of service toeing and heeling the pedal boards of the world. The member of staff at Timpson's told me he hadn't seen a pair like this for a while and was most interested to discover what their principal use is!

I can't imagine myself playing with any other shoes as the technique to know exactly which notes on the foot keyboard to toe and heel is so precise that any other footwear would make quick judgements very tricky.

Sleep in the Park – a mass sleep-out to end homelessness in Scotland for good on Saturday 9th December 2017

Social Bite, a proactive charity working around Scotland with and for homeless people, is organising the world's largest ever sleep-out and are hoping to attract 9,000 people to Edinburgh's Princes Street Gardens. The charity hopes that by raising funds and working together, the people of Scotland will create such an impetus that homelessness will be eradicated over a five-year period. The aim is not only to find provision for housing, but also to provide rehabilitation, job opportunities and support that will help people get back on their feet and find their place within society. The hope is that the many charities who work in these areas might also link up to provide ongoing support and care.

The vision is to make Scotland an example for the whole world to follow. We know we are a small country, but we are also a nation of innovators, explorers, and philanthropists. We are a small country with a big and generous heart.

At Christmas time there are many legitimate calls upon our time and our generosity. There are so many worthwhile charities and causes to support. But there is for Christians something compelling about the reality of homelessness that lies near the heart of the Christmas story. The homeless Christ-child, the refugee Holy Family.

Social Bite has gathered together a range of amazing people to the sleep-out. John Cleese, Deacon Blue, Rob Brydon, Sir Bob Geldof, Liam Gallagher and Amy Macdonald who will be present on the night.

You might not be able to take part yourself; a cold winter night in a park in December won't be possible for everyone. But you might know someone in your Church or workplace, a child or grandchild, a student friend or someone in a uniformed organisation, school, or a company who might be able to get involved individually or as a group. The challenge is for each individual to raise a minimum of £100 towards the cause. 2,000 people have already signed up. There's still some way to go to reach 9,000 people.

StColm's @StMichaels Guild

The Autumn session of the Guild seems to have flown by with good attendances at our fortnightly meetings. Among our speakers we have heard from The Very Reverend Dr Andrew McLelland (who opened the session), a group who help decorate orphanages in Belarus and from Mission International on the Guild project in Haiti.

To date the amount raised by Guilds in Scotland for the project in Quanaminthe, Haiti, has reached £69,000. The aim of this project is to construct a multipurpose building to be used as a school community centre and Church Centre. Overall over half a million pounds has been raised for the 6 Guild projects, quite a wonderful amount which clearly reflects the Scottish Guilds' interest in all the Christian work being undertaken here in Scotland and around the world. The theme 'Go in Love' is echoed in the projects Guild support. As we are nearing the end of this 3 year strategy applications to select new project partners for the coming 3 years are being considered. The successful projects will be announced in April 2018.

The Guild strategy for the years 2018-2021 is One Journey Many Roads and we look forward to hearing more about this.

The Rev Stewart Lamont held a Guild Dedication service on Sunday 19th December - again well attended by Guild members. He preached on loving those who are hard to love, this being the current Guild topic and he certainly gave listeners much to think and pray about.

Unfortunately our fund raising film show with Fred and Rita Daniels had to be cancelled due to Fred's illness. Fred thankfully, is now recovering and hopes to show his film on Golden America

on 13th March 2018. At the Guild meeting on 21st November we were able to disburse funds to the Church, the project in Haiti, the Belarus group, Christian Aid and Cross Reach.

Most of our speakers had requested that their fee be given to the Guild or to various charities which we had earlier complied with. The evening ended with a Name that Tune quiz, which was fun!

Our Christmas party is being held on 5th December when Iain and Margo Dunn and friends will entertain and on 6th December we are travelling to Pitlochry theatre to see 'Singin' in the Rain'. More fun!

Our meetings scheduled for next year include a valuation expert from Shape's auctioneers, the history of Tunnocks and a favourite speaker, Maureen Kelly on Amish and Shakers. All are welcome to Guild meetings which start at 7pm every second Tuesday from 9th January 2018.

St. Michael's Finance 2017

Report on the General Fund

The day to day running of St. Michael's is dealt with through our General Fund. Your weekly offering is used to pay for the gas and electricity, cleaning, salaries, Ministry Costs (which are paid to the Church of Scotland) and all other expenditure which occurs to keep or church open.

The expenditure from January to November this year has totaled £92,200 while the income has reached £91,500. I am hoping by the end of the financial year (December) that the income figure will be greater than the expenditure to show potential candidates for our vacancy that we are fairly strong financially.

Fabric and Restoration

The Fabric committee has again been very busy this year tackling as many repairs as they can in-house but for the larger jobs we have to call in the experts and they always come at a cost - a total so far of £35,575 (break-down below)

This year we have

- Refurbished the disabled toilet at a cost of £1,505
- Erected fencing around the back of the church £1,130
- Fire safety work £1,960
- Eradicated dry rot in the annexe £16,970
- Refurbished the annexe £6,100
- Fixed wiring inspection £835
- Electrical work following the fixed wiring inspection £3,880
- Other electrical repairs, boiler maintenance, plumbing work £3,195

Celebrating 150 years of Scripture Union Ministry

This year marked the 150th anniversary of the start of Scripture Union. On 2 June 1867, some 15 young children attended a children's meeting led by Josiah Spiers in the London suburb of Islington. One year later, on the 26th August 1868, in the beachside town of Llandudno, Wales, Josiah Spiers, concerned that children should hear the message about Jesus and how much God loved them, began writing 'God is love' in the sand. As children gathered around, he encouraged them to decorate the letters with shells and seaweed and told them stories about Jesus.

Scripture Union today works in over 130 countries around the world and is still introducing children and young people to Jesus. Although the gospel never changes, each culture expresses it in a particular way so the work is carried out through local people in ways which are appropriate to the country, culture and situation in which a movement is based. SU Scotland's vision is to see the children and young people of Scotland exploring the Bible and responding to the significance of Jesus. Do remember this work in your prayers.
