Fresh Start Autumn 2018

Each year Fresh Start helps thousands of new tenants, ranging from families to individuals, make a home for themselves. This can only be achieved by the hard work of their volunteers and the generosity of the donations they receive.

St Michaels Harvest Thanksgiving service will take place on Sunday 30th September and once again we are asking that you to support the charity Fresh Start and the starter packs they provide for homeless people who are moving into a new tenancy. They look for all sorts of items including pots and pans, kitchen utensils, small electrical items, cleaning materials, bedding, towels and non-perishable foods.

In their most recent appeal they were looking in particular for:

- Light bulbs (preferably bayonet caps)
- Pots and pans
- Crockery such as plates, bowls and mugs

With the exception of the foods and cleaning materials the items do not need to be brand new but should be of a reasonable condition such as you yourself would be prepared to use. All the following items are very gratefully received but please do not give other household items as Fresh Start are unable to accept them.

St Colm's @ St Michael's Guild

September heralds the re-start of many organisations throughout the Church in general and the Guild here at St Michael's is no exception to that practice. The syllabus for 2018/19 is almost ready and we look forward to our meetings beginning on **Wednesday 12th September at 2pm.**

The theme for this Session is 'Seeking The Way' under the 3 year strategy of One Journey Many Roads. We are privileged to have Martin Pearce, our Locum Minister lead us in this theme at our opening meeting. At a summer meeting on 29th May the Guild decided to support the project from the Boy's Brigade, Faith in Young People, specifically this will focus on 3 areas ,Growth in Faith, Growth in community partnerships, Growth in young people. The syllabus includes a speaker from this Project, it also includes a social film night during Guild Week in November when Rab Anderson, a well-known Scottish mountaineer and hill walker, will show us his journeys in the great outdoors. The topic for discussion this session is 'the unexpected journeys' . Much more is planned and the best way to find out about the Guild, its work, its meetings and the fun and friendship it brings is to come along, everyone is welcome.

During the summer months the Guild enjoyed an afternoon tea at the Dome with much cake and chatter, this was in place of a summer drive. The Presbyterial Guild (now called the Guild Council) organised a sail to Inchcolm Island. 80 Guild members (5 from our Guild) from the Edinburgh area attended on what was a glorious summer day in June. We set off from Queensferry and sailed on a very calm Forth spotting seals basking in the sunshine and arrived at Inchcolm with its views of Fife, Edinburgh and the east coast looking like something on the Mediterranean! We walked up to the abbey where the Rev Ian Gilmour conducted a moving Communion service with all the

elements. The communion silver had been carried over in his backpack! It was extra special as one considered the centuries where monks had worked and worshipped there. We completed the sail with a tour of the 3 bridges, it was quite amazing to be sailing underneath such structures - although the old rail bridge was still the favourite! An afternoon of worship and fellowship with the Guild.

2018 - Scotland's first ever Year of Young People (YOYP)

Looking at the themes developed by the Church of Scotland for YOYP, we find that that for September is Global Justice where churches are being asked to consider how their young people can build up their communities and make the world a better place and put their faith into action. For example, Boys' Brigade companies across Scotland are being encouraged to support the work of St Andrew's Refugee Service (StARS) in Cairo which provides a safe and inclusive space for displaced people to come together as a community. Money raised will be used to build outdoor play facilities for refugee children and young people.

"For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me." Matthew 25:35-40

Remembrance Day falls on Sunday, 1th November.

Why a poppy? During the First World War, previously beautiful countryside in Western Europe, was blasted, bombed and fought over, again and again swiftly turning to fields of mud where little or nothing could grow. Bright red Flanders poppies (*Papaver rhoeas*) however, were delicate but resilient flowers and flourished even in the middle of chaos and destruction. In early May 1915, shortly after losing a friend in Ypres, a Canadian doctor, Lt Col John McCrae was inspired by the sight of poppies to write a now famous poem called '**In Flanders Fields**'.

McCrae's poem inspired an American, Moina Michael, to make and sell red silk poppies which were brought to England by a French woman, Anna Guérin. The (Royal) British Legion, formed in 1921, ordered 9 million of these poppies and sold them on 11th November that year. The poppies sold out almost immediately and that first ever 'Poppy Appeal' raised over £106,000. This was used to help WW1 veterans with employment and housing.

The demand for poppies in England was so high that few were reaching Scotland. Earl Haig's wife established the 'Lady Haig Poppy Factory' in Edinburgh in 1926 to produce poppies exclusively for Scotland. Over 5 million Scottish poppies (which have four petals and no leaf unlike poppies in the rest of the UK) are still made by hand by disabled ex-Servicemen at Lady Haig's Poppy Factory each year.

Encouraging people into the Christian Faith

The routes to coming to the point in one's life when one is ready to profess the Christian faith publically are many and varied.

Most of us do not have the opportunity to see the physical risen Jesus but many of us experience a special feeling of the presence of the spirit of God or feel a series of nudges when the presence and love of God is laid on our hearts and enters our minds and souls.

For some people it is a growing realisation that there is much more to this life than simply going to work, establishing a home, pursuing our own interests, and sometimes sharing our lives with a partner. There comes a time therefore when one can say:
I do believe that there is an Almighty God who created the universe and the earth and people in his likeness.

And we can say: I do believe that his son Jesus is our Lord and saviour – our saviour from sin – all that we have done wrong in our lives – and our saviour from death – and hence death is but a door we pass through to the eternal home when we die in faith.....

God being a compassionate and loving God, as well as a God of judgement, gives us a helper called the Holy Spirit so we can say yes: **I believe in one God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; and I confess Jesus Christ as my saviour and Lord.**

Many followers of Jesus found that taking God into their lives brought love, joy and inner peace.

However, God does not protect us from all that goes wrong in the world.....misfortune, ill health, and death still come but they no longer hold the fears they once had.

Instead, faith in God the Father, Jesus his son and the Holy Spirit brings freedom from all human fears and gives us mental strength, emotional strength as well as spiritual strength.

During our services this year, we have reflected on the evidence that Jesus was no ordinary teacher or prophet, and heard how people like Thomas and the Apostles were changed by him.

We marvelled at his many miracles because there are too many to be explained unless Jesus was divine.....

We understood he spoke with unique authority.....he was not just a clever teacher

We acknowledged that Jesus did nothing wrong that deserved a crucifixion.....even Pontius Pilot did not find him guilty of deserving the death penalty.

We reflected on his amazing claims....that he was the son of man – the Messiah – the son of God.....albeit he did not admit that truth for some time until his triumphant entry into Jerusalem.

We were staggered by the many eye-witness accounts from people of different backgrounds and in different places that testify that Jesus rose from the dead and could eat and speak as a human and yet appear at will.

It is not an easy step to take; to admit that you have sinned, to realise that Jesus was crucified for your sins and to seek his forgiveness. It is probably one of the most difficult steps you will ever take, but it is undoubtedly the most important one which leads to a new life.

Entry into the Christian Faith is open to all people of all backgrounds but it brings responsibilities and along with our statement of belief we make promises to God when we promise:

- **to join regularly with our fellow Christians on the Lord's Day.**
- **to be faithful in reading the Bible, and in prayer**
- **to give a fitting proportion of our time, talents, and money for the Church's work in the world.**
- **to confess Christ before men, to serve him in my daily work, and to walk His ways all the days of my life.**

God loves you, whether you know him or not, and if you have not professed your Christian Faith before, or if it has become lukewarm, then think again about professing your Christian Faith. May God bless you and your loved ones all the days ahead.


