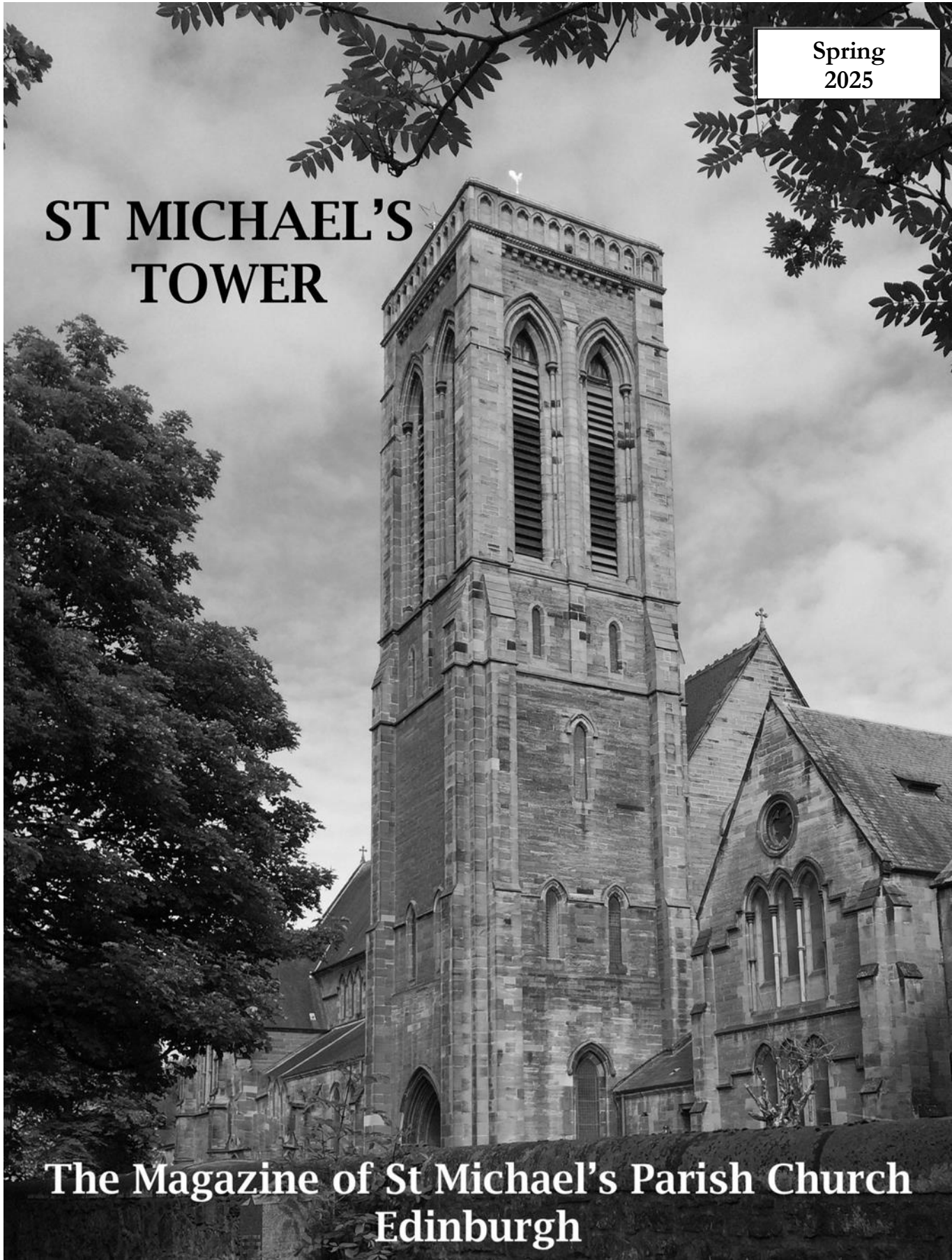

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Dear Members and Friends of St Michael's

Minister's Reflection

A woman dreamt she walked into a brand-new shop in the marketplace and, to her surprise, found God behind the counter. 'What do you sell here?' she asked. 'Everything your heart desires', said God. Hardly daring to believe what she was hearing the woman decided to ask for the best things a human could wish for. 'I want peace of mind and love and happiness and wisdom and freedom from fear' she said. Then, as an afterthought, she added 'Not just for me. For everyone on earth'. God smiled. 'I think you've got me wrong, my dear' he said. 'We don't sell fruits here. Only seeds.'

Gardeners among you will be getting ready to buy seeds and soon sow them in trays ready for germination on windowsills or greenhouses. It is just wonderful what some of you can achieve starting from small seeds and a wee bit of dirt and soil. What pleasure to walk past gardens bursting with colour and watching bees and all kinds of insect and bird life living amongst it later in the year.

The sore back and knees, the patience needed to prick out seedlings, the worry about cold or heat, wind or weather are little thought of by those passing by but well-known to all gardeners.

And yet the rewards are sheer beauty refreshing the soul, fruits and vegetables to harvest and to enjoy yourselves and with others. And soon all the discomfort and effort is forgotten in the sheer pleasure of it.

Jesus often used the ordinary tasks of farming and gardening to explain growing and tending growth in our lives. God the great gardener wants to plant seeds of love and wisdom in our hearts and minds which will lead to the beauty of lives well-lived, lived kindly and generously with each other.

Yet, in our times, there is more interest in 'things' and dazzling, flashy experiences rather than the contentment of the ordinary. How can we get people nowadays interested in God's seeds of peace, love and happiness?

For a while 'fast food' was all the rage. And then people began to notice that with the speed of production, the shortcuts and substitutes involved and the additives and E-numbers (all safe of course!) we lose a lot of flavour and textures, variety of dishes and techniques. And so 'slow food' was rediscovered to be far preferable.

As our society is discovering that not everything coming from the internet and social media is good and true, that too much use of all our computer screens (whatever size) shall diminish our ability to think for ourselves, find solutions and make connections with each other and the real world then maybe, just maybe, we shall discover/rediscover that 'slow living' is good for us – more wholesome and full of flavor like 'slow food'.

So, take time this Spring to enjoy God's creation on your walks in parks and gardens. Take time in prayer and reflection to let God's seeds germinate and take root in your heart and soul. Take time this Spring for God's springtime in Lent, when we will reflect on Jesus' journey to the Cross, his suffering and death which, astonishingly, was not the end of it all but a whole new beginning.

As the poet and environmentalist, Gideon Heugh, wrote:

Devastating Beauty

On Friday, my hope died.
The sky wept itself dark
the ground broke apart
and all creation cried
for the bloodied innocence
hammered into a tree.

There were whispers
of a torn curtain
but they didn't reach my ears
or mend my mangled heart
or stem the bitter tears
as we took
the body
down.

On Saturday we grieved,
hiding from the troops
whom we once believed
would be overthrown
by the carpenter's boy,
who had preached
and fed and healed
and was now dead.

...

But then on Sunday –
the devastating beauty
of that Sunday –
when time and space
were blown out of shape
and angels wrapped in electric grace
rolled the impossible away,

he is not here
they proclaimed
for glory had risen
our failings were forgiven
and the rules of life and death
were rewritten
as an empty tomb declared:
Love is alive.

Name for the new congregation

As the number of worshippers within the Church of Scotland continues to decline congregations all over the country are being forced to unite.

St Michael's congregation is to unite with those of Barclay Viewforth, Polwarth and Craiglockhart. In preparation the Implementation Team, with representatives from all four congregations, has facilitated finding a new name for the united Parish. This new name shall not impact on the current names of each building but shall instead be the name of the new combined Parish unit.

After asking for suggestions from all four congregations, sifting through the responses, putting these to a vote and then receiving subsequent approval of the four Sessions we can now reveal that the new name is proposed as:

Edinburgh: Merchiston and Canalside Church of Scotland

This proposal shall now go to the Legal Department of the Church for approval and, finally, shall be voted on by the Sessions and all members of the four congregations as part of the 'Basis of Union' document. All being well this may well happen during the second half of this year.

4 Churches Conversations at St John's, Oxfangs

On Saturday 17 January 17 attendees from St Michael's congregation met with others from the three congregations we are to unite with to share what we each treasure about our worship and our work as individual congregations.

David Clarkson, Minister of Barclay Viewforth, wrote an excellent summary of the morning. I thought it might help us all to read this and understand better what is happening.

Four church conversation update

Thank you to everyone who came to the four churches event last Saturday. We had over 100 adults and seven children which was amazing. Each congregation was represented, and it was good to hear how people are feeling about the union and what should happen as we move forward. In the circumstances we face it is understandable that people have questions and feel unsettled or angry, however, there was a generally positive response on the day. There are many similarities in our congregations e.g. all of us support organisations like Bethany Christian Trust, Fresh Start and the foodbank and that will continue. Of course, there were difficult questions, some of which have no answer yet, and some things were stated as 'facts' which are simply not true, or not yet agreed. Every congregation will find that there are changes. One congregation will have significantly more change than the others due to the loss of a building, but things will not be the same anywhere. The new Kirk Session will have to decide on where and when public worship will take place – and it may not be 10.30 or 11 am on Sunday morning in every building – even these basic things have still to be worked through and agreed.

Each Kirk Session (and the congregation of St Michael's) has agreed the new name to be Edinburgh: Merchiston and Canalside and this will be added to the proposed Basis of Union. However, that still has to be agreed by Presbytery, and central committees, before going to a vote of each congregation. We are waiting for a response from the panel which is reviewing Presbytery's decision that St Michael's building should be disposed of. Once we have a final decision on that we can move forward. When the time to vote arrives, each congregation will vote on the Basis of Union, then the Basis of Team Ministry (how the team is made up and the responsibilities

We submitted papers along with our reasoning behind the objection. Presbytery too had to submit further documentation. All this was then sent on to a panel of three in another Presbytery. They had three months in which to reply and have now come back to us rejecting our appeal. By church law we can now do no more for our building.

What are we to do now as a congregation, as people and as a family of faith? Walk on in faith.

Let us co-operate as best we can with the other three congregations to prepare for the union of the four congregations. We have already decided that this new congregation shall likely be called '*Edinburgh: Merchiston and Canalside, Church of Scotland*'.

Which of the three remaining buildings shall be used for regular worship and what they may be called will have to be decided in the future.

All members and adherents shall be allowed to vote for or against the union and for or against the two ministers continuing. David Clarkson and Gordon Kennedy, whose charges are full tenure charges, will be the ministers continuing should they agree to this increased workload and new calling.

The voting process may happen at some point in late May. There is a joint service of all four congregations planned on Sunday 11 May in Polwarth Church and this shall be followed by a picnic in their gardens.

Change for us shall be great and is unavoidable. But the other three congregations, and indeed all the Church of Scotland, are facing great change. There are just not enough younger people coming forward to keep all congregations going. This is just the start and we at St Michael's feel the changes most acutely and early on.

Martin Luther, the great 16th century church reformer, was once asked 'What would you do if you knew the end of the world was coming tomorrow?' Martin Luther answered 'I would go out today to plant an apple tree!'

The shape of our church may change greatly. But God loves us and wants to sustain us throughout it all.

So, hold on to your faith, in that love which wants to bring about life to the full. Take the seeds of God's love and plant them in any way you can.

Annual Stated Meeting 2025

The Christmas parties took place in the visit room in the prison allowing the children's parent or guardian to take part. Gifts were also given out directly from the visitors, collected by the parent or guardian of the children.

The number of children that received gifts was down on last year's wonderful achievement. This was because the number of children that passed through the visitor's centre was down on last year. We achieved our aim, which is to ensure that every child that visited the visitors centre received Christmas presents.

We did receive some media interest the Scotsman and the BBC did an article about the gift collection. The Justice Minister Angela Constance when she heard about the gift collection, took time out of her schedule to visit the visitors' centre and helped with wrapping of some of the gifts.

My thanks as always go to you. Without your support the Edinburgh prison Christmas gift collection have stopped a long time ago.

My thanks also go to the Barnardo's staff in the visitors' centre Shona, Patrizia and Ann all played an important part in making it a success.

My thanks also go to the senior managers of the prison for supporting me and allowing me to organise the gift collection.

I am already looking forward to this year's 2025 Christmas gift collection. It will be the fortieth year in a row that the gift collection started by Rev John Murie will have taken place.

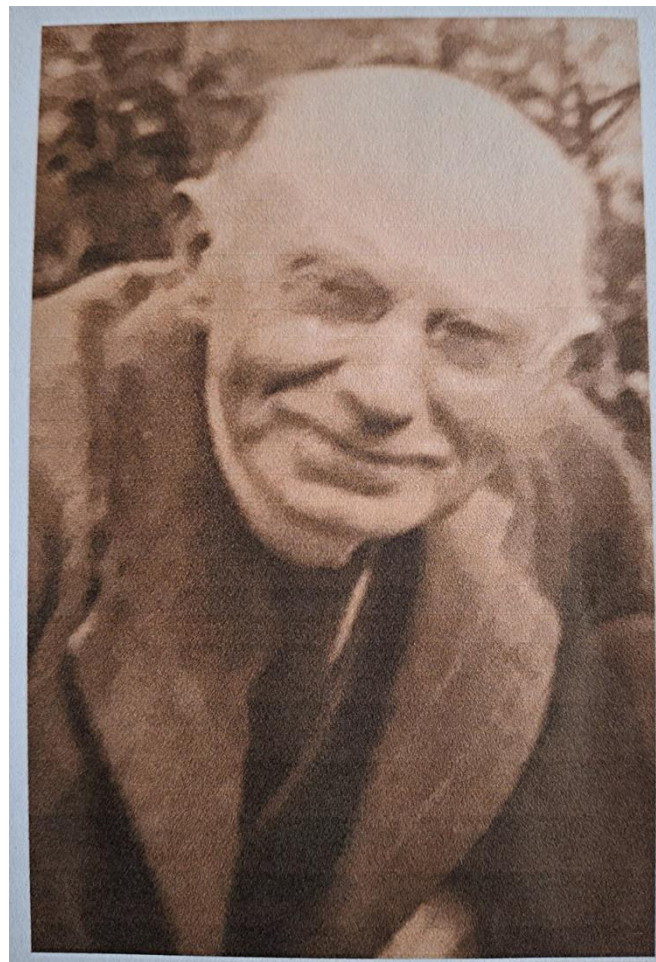

'*The Windermere Children*' is a 2020 British/German production telling the story of a group of young survivors of the Holocaust brought to a camp of huts in the Lake District in 1945. Part of a wider scheme which aimed to rehabilitate some 700 young people, it is a very moving tale of individuals and a community learning and healing from the inhumanity of their lives in the death camps of Nazi Europe.

The young people are played by actors from Poland giving the film an immediate authenticity. In October 2020, *The Windermere Children* won the Best European TV Movie of the Year prize at Prix Europa. A jury member commented 'This story gives hope, told with a twinkle in the eye, making the children's stories, their traumas and their losses manageable for the viewer.'

We screen the film on Sunday 6 April at 7.00pm.

Stuart Montgomery and Music in St. Michael's

Celebrating thirty-two years of music-making in St. Michael's gave me some food for thought, apropos what we have achieved together in music, during these past decades.

At my anniversary service, on Sunday the 19th of January, which equalled David Paterson's thirty-two years between 1917 and 1949, Margaret Forrester reported, so eloquently, so diplomatically, about the various organists and musical directors during her twenty-two year reign as minister of our church. I listened, and I learned much about my predecessors!

Margaret made reference to St. Michael's not having a choir for several years (now it's my turn to be diplomatic!), and when I was interviewed for the job (incidentally in the church kitchen), I asked about the choir. I can still remember the shuffling of feet, notably from George McArthur, Jean Yeoman and a few others, quite clearly. I had asked something that nobody wanted to talk about. But then someone did say "oh, well your predecessor didn't want us". To which I replied, "what nonsense, we shall start rehearsals immediately".

That was in January 1993, and for twenty years thereafter, the St. Michael's Choir performed anthems, oh on around thirty weeks every year. For many years, the choir was renowned and had won competitions, for which there are certificates to behold. There were about fourteen of us and we worked hard. I always chose pieces that would be appealing to the congregation, and not too demanding for the choir. We learned a myriad of repertoire, ranging from unaccompanied anthems by Purcell, Wesley, Goss, Bach and others to modern arrangements by Bell, Kendrick and more which I created; writing vocal parts, incorporating 'samba band' type percussion instruments, clapping and all kinds of visual methods which had even the most seriously minded in the pews smiling!

Sadly, many choir members became less able, and died. The choir ceased around twelve years ago, and we then created two *Music for Reflection*

slots for each service; these would be filled mainly by instrumentalists and singers coming in, but in recent years I have played two pieces on the piano. It has always been my intention to perform music that will be appealing, as well as feeling reflective and appropriate. St. Michael's loves film music and anything from the shows always goes down a treat. I have played many modern theme arrangements which originated as classical compositions, and on the occasions when I play the famous Polovtsian dance, by Borodin, I am usually met with smiles from several corners saying "Oh how I love *Stranger in Paradise*". Our congregation has taught me many things, but on one occasion I almost caught them out by playing my own arrangement of a popular Rod Stewart song. I had decided that the lyrics of the song were quite unsuitable for a church service, and so I played what is a rock number, but as a cradle song, slow and reflective — I also changed its name, from *Maggie May* to *Rose of Peace*. I swear I could have heard tapping on mobile telephones as people tried to look up the best known Rod Stewart songs....a few worked it out, and we all laughed.

It was joyous when our choir teamed up with Longniddry Church, in East Lothian, with minister Robin Hill inviting us to take part in a Songs of Praise with their choir. And we did the same at Gladsmuir Kirk, in a special evening service.

But the nicest occasion was when a bridal couple asked specifically for our choir to sing a couple of anthems at their wedding. One of the pieces we did was my own arrangement of 'It's me, It's me oh Lord, standing in the need of Prayer'; they loved it and we performed with great aplomb. The couple gave us £200, and I decided we would all go for Afternoon Tea, thereafter, at the Sheraton Hotel, and this was just super.

During James Aitken's ministry I introduced a new recital series called St. Michael's at Six. This would comprise a concert of around 60 minutes, once a month, on Sundays. We had eleven each year for six years. I always wanted to learn about music administration, and this was a big task. We had every style of music, everything. From metallic-pop to Country and Western, to 'Dark Matter', Schubert lieder recitals, to choirs, to string ensembles, to organ recitals, piano recitals, quartets, to harp and clarsach soirees with poetry, and also concerts for brass and percussion. Most of the performers were local, and we gave the opportunity for people to come and perform in a formal atmosphere. Admission was by donation, and hundreds of people came to St. Michael's for the first time. We publicised each concert, recording them on Compact Disc, and we opened our doors wide — we became a proper music venue.

In recent years, St. Michael's runs concerts during the Edinburgh Festival, and Neil Price has masterminded a great series of recitals with performers from all over the UK, and beyond. There really is a most special atmosphere during these weeks, and I love to see the railings outside covered in concert posters, promoting each one day after day, in August. Neil has a great love for organ music and I enjoy when he, and any of the congregation come up to the organ, and sit alongside to watch me playing. In the last two or three years, Neil has been giving me gifts of new and wonderful organ pieces, expanding my repertoire nicely. Each one has been a treat to learn and perform, in services and recitals.

Somebody asked me recently was there a particular reason I have stayed at St. Michael's for so long? I have never had any doubts about this. We have a beautiful church, which is actually a little cathedral. We have the most awesome acoustics (I used to joke with the choir when they would perform unaccompanied, with me conducting at the front, that when there were difficulties with tuning and articulation not to worry too much....the fine acoustics would cover up any problems!). St. Michael's is also blessed with a beautiful organ and, since 2000, a fine grand piano.

It has always been a pleasure to have my music for the services publicised, on our website, in and around the church, and on the Order of Service each Sunday. I create 'music menus' for the month ahead and this keeps me on my toes — when you do this you have to practise to make sure everything is of a high standard. After all, it's going on to Youtube so it needs to be good!

But really, it's the people of St. Michael's who are the most special. In the 1980s, I enjoyed deputising in many churches in and around Edinburgh, often for more than 40 weeks in the year. Occasionally, I would be invited to stand-in at St. Michael's, and I always felt there was something different here. I have no hesitation in saying I have never encountered a nicer, warmer group of people anywhere. And that hasn't changed.

We are a very special 'family', and I have been honoured and privileged to belong to St. Michael's for thirty-two years.

My celebratory service was magnificent, for members and guests alike. I felt thoroughly humbled and spoiled at the words, gifts, cards and messages, and the tremendous luncheon in the hall afterwards.

Thank-you to everyone, you are all so very dear to me.



Leading the World ..

The following quote seems just as applicable to some of our World Leaders now as much as those who resisted Adolf Hitler over 80 years ago.

Stupidity is worse than malice. Some leaders have no morality, no sense of history, will flaunt international law ... and worse, due to stupidity and greed. The great theologian, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, who resisted Hitler, wrote this in the 1940s:

'Stupidity is a more dangerous enemy of the good than malice. One may protest against evil; it can be exposed and, if need be, prevented by the use of force. Evil always carries within itself the germ of its own subversion in that it leaves behind, in human beings at least, a sense of unease. Against stupidity we are defenceless. Neither protest nor the use of force accomplish anything here; reason falls on deaf ears; facts that contradict one's prejudgement simply need not be believed – in such moments the stupid person even becomes critical – and when facts are irrefutable they are just pushed aside as inconsequential, as incidental. In all this the stupid person, in contrast to the malicious one, is utterly self-satisfied and, being easily irritated, becomes dangerous by going on the attack. For that reason, greater caution is called for when dealing with a stupid person than with a malicious one. Never again will we try to persuade the stupid person with reasons, for it is senseless and dangerous.'

Many thanks to all who took part in the Write for Rights campaign before Christmas. In the service on 15 December we heard of the cases we were involved with this time: Mariya Kalesnikava in Belarus; Oqba Hashad, imprisoned in Egypt because of his brother's protests and, in Hungary, a defender of human rights, Professor Korur Fincanci for whom Stuart played a beautiful adaptation of 'Moonlight Sonata', her favourite piece of music. After the service, we signed and sent messages of hope to six different cases across the world.

We also heard of Ana da Silva Miguel, a singer/performer known as Neth Nahara, jailed in Angola for insulting its President and sent her our support. A few weeks ago we were delighted to learn of her release following the Amnesty International campaign.

You may remember a case from 2022 from Cameroon. After more than four years of detention for peacefully protesting, Dorgelesse Nguessan has been released. She can now join her loved ones after more than four years wrongly imprisoned solely for peacefully exercising her human rights.

We sent nearly 200 cards to brave men and women threatened or imprisoned for defending human rights. Even when there is no immediate change of mind from those in authority, they are made aware of international concern. Thanks again to all who wrote the cards and contributed.
